Keep Louisiana Beautiful: Love the Boot Week

Lt. Governor Billy Nungesser and Keep Louisiana Beautiful will host Love the Boot Week April 20-28, 2024 during National Volunteer Week. Individuals and groups across the state can sign up to participate in Louisiana's largest litter cleanup and beautification event. In 2023, 12,777 individuals volunteered a total of 61,493 hours, removing 313 tons of litter in all 64 parishes.

Louisiana CASA

Louisiana's Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) mission is to build, support, and advocate for a statewide network of Court-Appointed trained volunteers to speak for abused and neglected children. 18 local CASA programs are serving all 64 parishes in Louisiana. The CASA volunteer continues until the case is permanently resolved. One of the primary benefits of the CASA program is that, unlike other court principals who often rotate cases, the CASA volunteer is a consistent figure

in the proceedings and provides continuity for the child.

Data shows that children who are assigned a CASA volunteer advocate are more likely to:

- Find a safe, permanent home
- Spend less time in foster care
- Have fewer moves between foster placements
- Do better in school
- Receive the services they need
- Avoid re-entry into foster care

Volunteer Opportunity Spotlight

Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana

Volunteers play an important role in the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana's mission to rebuild our state's coast. Individual volunteers, groups, and corporate partners can get involved in coastal restoration efforts through service opportunities.

Types of volunteer opportunities at CRCL

- Helping prepare oyster shells by shoveling them into marine-grade bags so they can be dropped into the water.
- Planting trees or marsh grasses, combined with an airboat trip through the swamp.
- Joining staff on an oyster boat and helping them deploy a reef





- Since the 1930s, more than 2,000 square miles of coastal wetlands in Louisiana have disappeared. (They have been converted into open water.) This has had catastrophic effects on our communities, our culture, our industries and our fisheries. Wetlands also provide natural hurricane protection to inland communities; when we have fewer wetlands, we have less protection. There are many factors behind coastal land loss.
- CRCL was founded in 1988 as the first statewide nonprofit in Louisiana that was dedicated to confronting coastal land loss.
- Since 2007, CRCL has planted more than 1 million trees other plants. We planted 12,000 plugs of dune grasses and nearly 3,000 bald cypress trees in 2023 alone. As part of the Central Wetlands Reforestation Collective, CRCL and its partner organizations will be planting more than 30,000 bald cypress (the state tree!) in the next few years.
- We recycled 830 tons of oyster shell in 2023, built our fifth oyster reef and engaged more than 1,700 volunteers just through our Oyster Shell Recycling Program.
