


Volunteer Louisiana (VLA), the state service commission in the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, was established in 1993 under the National and Community Service Trust Act.



Mational Service in Jouisiana

Well before the creation of AmeriCorps in 1993, the United States federal government created National Service initiatives such as Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA), the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), the Foster Grandparent Program, the Senior Companion Program, and the National Civilian Conservation Corps (NCCC). These initiatives served vital roles to promote civic engagement and community development and to address critical needs across the country and in Louisiana. Their contributions to Louisiana continue today alongside newer programs such as AmeriCorps National, AmeriCorps Louisiana, and Public Health AmeriCorps.

BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS OF ACADIANA

Boys and Girls Club of Acadiana

AmeriCorps members provide programming and activities to improve academic engagement and social-emotional skills for youth. Members also address childhood obesity through education-based, health-related activities and mentoring during the school year and summer months.



BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS OF NORTH LOUISIANA

Boys and Girls Club of North Louisiana

AmeriCorps members improve educational and behavioral outcomes of students in low-achieving elementary and middle schools. during the school year and summer months. Members assist in preparation for success in post-secondary education institutions for economically disadvantaged students.



City Year Baton Rouge

AmeriCorps members provide support to students in Baton Rouge schools. Members help students improve their attendance, lead schoolwide events, provide afterschool programming, and lead individual and small group tutoring sessions for students.



City Year New Orleans

AmeriCorps members partner with teachers in New Orleans schools to: add more instructional support, help create learning environments where all students can build on their strengths and fully engage in their learning, and get more students on track for graduation.







Food Bank of Central Louisiana

AmeriCorps members address food insecurity across nearly 30 communities in 11 Central Louisiana parishes through the Food Bank's Mobile Pantry Program. The team assists with food distribution, Food Bank participant intake, relationship management, and other service referrals for Louisianans needing support.

For Providers by Providers

AmeriCorps members serve in the Early Childhood Teacher Corps to enhance opportunities for youth from birth to 5 years of age. They implement activities to boost readiness, provide classroom support, and address the need for well-prepared early childhood teachers across New Orleans.





Louisiana Vet Corps

AmeriCorps members serve as peer mentors to veterans and military-affiliated students at colleges and universities across Louisiana. Members connect veterans to the Louisiana Department of Veterans Affairs veterans' assistance programs, training faculty, and LDVA staff and community members.

Rebuilding Together New Orleans

AmeriCorps members engage in home repair projects in the New Orleans area. These projects improve the quality of life for area homeowners, including building projects to allow mobility and independence such as wheelchair ramps or exterior weatherization repairs to lower utility costs.



Serve Louisiana

AmeriCorps members provide capacity building services to increase the efficiency, effectiveness and scope and reach of partner organizations that serve local children, families, and communities in the Baton Rouge and New Orleans areas.







ShreveCorps

AmeriCorps members improve area native biodiversity by cleaning and remediating unused lots in low-income zip codes of Caddo Parish. Members also assist with the Urban Farm Build a Farmer Program; build pocket parks, create native habitat refuges, and, improve public lands.

SEE West Monroe

AmeriCorps members provide after-school homework assistance and enrichment activities to students in grades 1-3 during the school year. Members also implement a summer youth program and host financial literacy programs for adults at the West Monroe Community Center.

****** Teach For America

Teach For America - Louisiana

AmeriCorps members serve for two years as full-time teachers who promote academic growth for students, engage as volunteer leaders within their schools and communities, and engage parents and community members as volunteers in low-income and underresources schools.



University of Louisiana at Lafayette AmeriCorps

AmeriCorps members serve with several initiatives, including: building homes with Habitat for Humanity; providing academic support at two elementary schools in Lafayette; and engaging in community and university-based environmental stewardship projects to promote environmental sustainability.



Up2Us Sports

AmeriCorps members serve as coach-mentors and provide sports-based youth development mentoring for economically disadvantaged young people in New Orleans schools. Members' ultimate goal is to leverage physical fitness and social dexterity to better outcomes for participating youth and their communities.





As AmeriCorps continued its 30th Anniversary celebrations into late summer, CEO Michael D. Smith, members of the AmeriCorps Board of Directors, and AmeriCorps agency staff visited southeast Louisiana. At the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana's (CRCL) Restoration Headquarters in Violet (St. Bernard Parish), the delegation learned about CRCL's Oyster Shell Recycling and Native Plants programs. The AmeriCorps delegation and Volunteer Louisiana are pictured above celebrating the members and programs' successes on an oyster shell drying bed at Restoration Headquarters.

AmeriCorps members serving with CRCL from the Louisiana Delta Service Corps' Serve Louisiana program hosted the delegation for a hands-on tour. Members shared insights about their AmeriCorps service contributing to the long-term resilience of the state's coastal communities and ecosystems.

The Volunteer Louisiana's Disaster Services team and the NOLA Ready team presented to the AmeriCorps delegation about Volunteer Louisiana's portfolio of Volunteer Generation Fund (VGF) initiatives. These statewide efforts improve Louisiana communities' disaster preparation, train local residents how to engage with disaster recovery efforts, and improve communication and coordination among Louisiana's Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters (VOADs).

This year, we launched a new training course that teaches best practices in volunteer engagement. This training is a free resource to maximize the use of volunteer time and retain skilled volunteer talents. With over 300 Louisianans trained in the first year, we plan to expand the curriculum to serve broader audiences in the future. THE POWER OF COMMITMENT:

The annual Champions of Service Awards recognizes outstanding volunteers who go above and beyond through a competitive award process.



Award recipients are selected from seven geographic regions across the state, along with an outstanding AmeriCorps member and volunteer group.

This year's selection process for Champions of Service was highly competitive with Volunteer Louisiana receiving over 280 nominations from across the state.





Northwest Jalynn Pickers

Jalynn founded Jalynn's Locker to assist homeless youth in Caddo Parish with emergency clothing. Her leadership fills a critical gap, inspiring peers and showing how service transforms communities for the better.



Northeast Champion Evelyn Blakeney

Evelyn leads Sew Happy Ladies, creating essential items for global and local causes. She fosters community among retirees, enriching lives through service, and building connections that inspire fellowship and purpose.



Central Champion Lilly Harvey



Capital Area Landis Manchester

After losing her daughter, Lilly founded Millie Mattered and expanded addiction advocacy to 16 cities. Hosting walks and memorials, she has spearheaded initiatives like "Millie's Law" to reduce overdose deaths, offering hope and recovery to many.



Southwest Janny Duhon

A working father of four, Landis' tireless efforts embody community service and inclusion by supporting special needs athletes. As Ambassador for Ainsley's Angels, Landis has expanded inclusive events, recruiting 57 participants in 2023.



Southeast Mark Michaud

Danny volunteered more than 1,000 hours at Hospice of Acadiana in 2023, spreading joy to patients and families. From providing rosaries to uplifting staff, his boundless compassion makes him a cherished member of the team.

Mark leads Southeast Louisiana Underwater Search and Rescue's (SELAUSAR) and has conducted more 50 recoveries, including several high-profile cases. Despite challenges, his dedication to training and aiding families in crisis exemplifies the impact of selfless service.

Dads & Kids is a community-focused organization led by Clarence Lazard, Quitin Doyle, Baron Richard, Caleb Aguillard, Gary Mitchell, Chad Lemelle, and Ryan LeDay Williams. Together, they have built a network of volunteers spanning four parishes. The group's core mission is to encourage men to show up for the kids in their community by making a positive impact in their local schools and neighborhoods.























Volunteer Louisiana and the Office of the Lt. Governor, in collaboration with Feeding Louisiana, launched the Million Meals for MLK initiative. In celebration of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. National Day of Service, this statewide campaign addresses the critical issue of food insecurity in Louisiana by mobilizing volunteers and contributors to make a lasting impact.

The launch event, held at the Greater Baton Rouge Food Bank, brought together participants for hands-on activities, including meal-packing stations where volunteers worked side by side to pack nutritious meals for immediate distribution to families in need. Key corporate sponsors, such as Louisiana Blue, shared their support for the initiative, highlighting the importance of addressing hunger across the state. The campaign goal is to distribute one million meals to vulnerable populations throughout Louisiana in January 2025.

Volunteer Louisiana is charged in Louisiana's Emergency Operations Plan, Emergency Support Function (ESF-7), with the coordination of spontaneous unaffiliated volunteers. Volunteer Louisiana is the recipient of a competitive Volunteer Generation Fund (VGF) grant from the AmeriCorps agency. This grant award is applied to increase volunteer capacity for Louisiana's disaster preparedness, response, and recovery efforts with an emphasis on Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) trainings.



Volunteer Louisiana and the West Feliciana Parish CERT team hosted a multi-parish Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) shelter training with the American Red Cross of Louisiana

The training took place in St. Francisville where approximately 50 attendees were trained representing more than 7 parishes.

Volunteer Louisiana manages Louisiana's Community Emergency Response Team program, which is designated by FEMA Region 6 in partnership with the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness (GOHSEP). The Louisiana CERT Program is designed to train and organize community volunteer members to 1) be a response asset during times of emergency or disaster; and 2) to be an extension of first responder services until professional responders arrive.

TRAININGS & SPECIAL EXCERCISES







CAMPUS PARTNERSHIPS

Volunteer Louisiana partnered with campuses across the state to strengthen community resilience and preparedness. The University of Louisiana at Monroe's CERT team, Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine in Monroe's rural medical integration, Grambling State University's HBCU leadership, and Fletcher Technical Community College in Schriever's "Fletcher Strong" resiliency hub are standout initiatives showcasing innovation and collaboration for a stronger Louisiana.







ANIMAL RESPONSE

Volunteer Louisiana and the Louisiana State Animal Response Team (LSART) partnered to enhance animal emergency preparedness through hands-on training. At LSU's Veterinary College, a responder boot camp equipped volunteers with essential skills pet evacuation, large animal sheltering, and decontamination, ensuring readiness for disaster response. At the Louisiana National Guard Child and Youth Camps in Pineville, they trained 160 youth in pet emergency kits, sheltering in place, and evacuation planning. efforts fostered a culture preparedness and awareness among the next generation.



THE POWER OF PROGRESS:

PRESENTATIONS & PARTNERSHIPS



PRESENTATIONS

Volunteer Louisiana showcased its expertise through key presentations this fall. At the Louisiana Emergency Management Conference, the Disaster & Volunteer Services Team hosted a panel featuring nonprofits, faith-based organizations, VOADs, and CERT experts, highlighting their roles in building resilient communities, and closed with a plenary on VCOM's impact on rural preparedness. At the FEMA Region 6 Higher Education Summit, the team presented on higher education's role as disaster response force multipliers, identified new Campus CERT trainers, and earned a place on the 2025 summit planning committee.







PARTNERSHIPS

This year, Volunteer Louisiana partnered with Niagara University and the Red Cross to train emergency managers and volunteers across Louisiana to assist individuals with disabilities during disasters. Volunteer Louisiana continues to also partner with the Louisiana Commission for the Deaf to conduct CERT trainings across Louisiana.

Volunteer Louisiana also supported a two-day MCI exercise in New Orleans with more than 200 participants, featuring a mass casualty bomb simulation with more than 100 volunteers, followed by after-action learning to improve response strategies for emergency managers and first responders.







COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP:

Thining a Spotlight on Service

Jim Addison, a dedicated community volunteer and leader of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) in West Monroe, exemplifies the core values of Volunteer Louisiana. His steadfast commitment to disaster preparedness and community resilience has positioned him as a cornerstone of volunteerism in Ouachita and Union Parishes, providing critical support in times of need.

Jim Addison's leadership within the CERT program has been transformative for West Monroe. A graduate of the University of Louisiana at Monroe's Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), Addison embodies the program's mission to empower older adults to make meaningful contributions to their communities. Under his guidance, trained CERT members collaborate with police, firefighters, and emergency responders to strengthen neighborhood preparedness and safety.

Beyond CERT, Addison's commitment to community service extends to his work with West Monroe's Community Police Programs. He mobilizes volunteers for initiatives like Coffee with a Cop, Youth Camps, Shop with a Cop, Are You Okay for Seniors, and the West Monroe Citizen's Police Academy. These programs build trust between the community and law enforcement while contributing thousands of volunteer hours annually.

Jim's dedication also shines through his involvement with the American Red Cross, where he trains for Emergency Response Vehicle (ERV) operations. The ERV, a signature Red Cross asset, delivers food, emergency supplies, and medical care to disaster survivors. In Ouachita Parish, Jim and his CERT team assist families affected by house fires, providing comfort and support during their most challenging times.

America's Service Tommissions

Volunteer Louisiana is an active member of the America's Service Commissions (ASC) network. Volunteer Louisiana staff attended the annual ASC Leadership Convening in Washington D.C. in February, the ASC National Service Training in Minneapolis in April, and hosted ASC colleagues in Baton Rouge for the Strengths Accelerator in December.

In 2024, Judd Jeansonne began his third term as ASC Board Chair. In that capacity, he participated in a bicameral Congressional briefing on the work of state commissions coordinated by the National Service Caucus and briefed the new administration's transition team on state commission policy priorities. Volunteer Louisiana is proud to support ASC and elevate the work of state commissions.


