I am proud to present the 2025 Volunteer Louisiana Annual Report.

The Volunteer Louisiana Commission and entire national service field faced unprecedented adversity in 2025. In January, state service commissions and AmeriCorps programs nationwide were required to navigate a complex series of executive orders that were applied retroactively to existing operating grants. In April, the Department of Government Efficiency eliminated approximately 85 percent of the AmeriCorps agency workforce and terminated 80 percent of active AmeriCorps grants. Meanwhile, the Office of Management and Budget impounded more than half of the FY25 appropriated funds. Although the grant terminations were later overturned and members reinstated, the interruption had real and lasting impacts, including the loss of two programs from our portfolio.

Despite these obstacles, 2025 stands as a landmark year for Volunteer Louisiana. AmeriCorps Louisiana members responded to adversity with true servant leadership by placing the needs of their neighbors above their own. AmeriCorps Louisiana programs responded with perseverance, innovation and flexibility, and we welcomed two new AmeriCorps programs into our portfolio. We hosted the first-ever Lt. Governor’s Volunteer and Disaster Services Summit, strengthening collaboration among government, nonprofit, and philanthropic partners. We launched our inaugural volunteer engagement training, equipping nonprofits across the state with valuable tools, and the inaugural Million Meals for MLK campaign which provided 2.3 million meals for Louisiana families.

I am incredibly proud of the resilience displayed and the dedicated leaders who navigated uncertainty while keeping service at the forefront. Resilience is woven throughout this report in the stories of programs, members, partners, and communities who refused to let setbacks define what was possible. I invite you to read on and learn more about what we achieved together in 2025, and I look forward to building on this momentum in 2026.

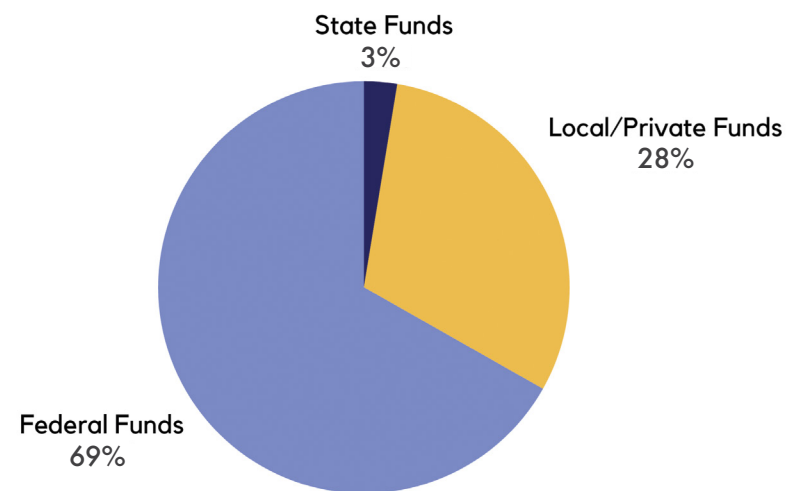
OVERVIEW

LEADERSHIP RECOGNITION



NATIONAL SERVICE ADVOCACY

When the national service field faced its greatest existential threats in 2025, Louisiana leaders stepped up with bipartisan support. Representatives Cleo Fields and Troy Carter sent a joint letter to the White House, while Senator Bill Cassidy and Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser spoke out publicly against the grant terminations. Lt. Governor Nungesser also worked with his counterpart in Colorado to author a bipartisan letter urging continued support for AmeriCorps funding, and Senator Cassidy worked on a bipartisan basis with Senator Chris Coons of Delaware to urge the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to release the impounded funds.

This bipartisan advocacy, along with several favorable court rulings – including cases in Louisiana – paid off. Terminated grants were ultimately reinstated, approximately half of terminated AmeriCorps employees returned to service, and OMB released the impounded funds. Volunteer Louisiana is deeply grateful for the leadership, advocacy, and bipartisan commitment of Louisiana’s elected officials and partners during this challenging year.



› In April, Executive Director Judd Jeansonne received the Stoneman Brown Advocate of the Year Award from Voices for National Service for “Exemplary determination, creativity, and results in building support for national service among our nation’s leaders.”

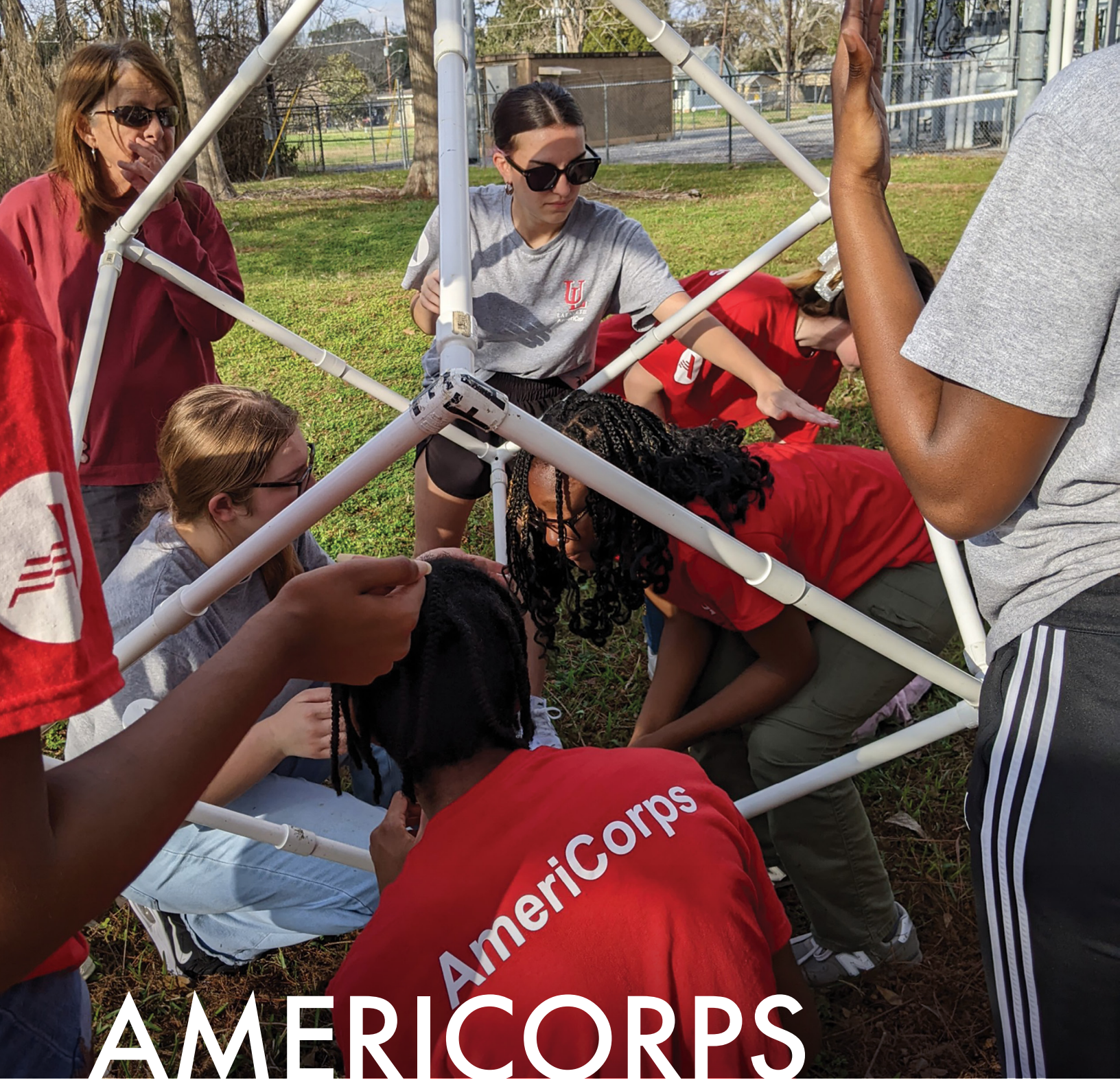

AMERICORPS LOUISIANA PROGRAMS

During the 2024-25 program year, Volunteer Louisiana supported 14 AmeriCorps Louisiana programs with 586 member positions across 161 service locations in 27 parishes. Despite mid-year grant terminations, including nine AmeriCorps State Formula programs supporting 330 members, AmeriCorps Louisiana programs completed the year strong and continued to serve critical needs in their communities across the state.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Acadiana

AmeriCorps members provide programming and activities to improve academic engagement and social-emotional skills for youth. Members also address childhood obesity through education-based, health-related activities and mentoring during the school year and summer months.

Boys & Girls Clubs of North Louisiana

AmeriCorps members improve educational and behavioral outcomes of students in low-achieving elementary and middle schools. Members assist in preparation for success in post-secondary education institutions for economically disadvantaged students.

City Year Baton Rouge

AmeriCorps members provide support to students in Baton Rouge schools. Members help students improve their attendance, lead schoolwide events, provide after-school programming, and lead individual and small group tutoring sessions for students.



City Year New Orleans

AmeriCorps members partner with teachers in New Orleans schools to: add more instructional support; help create learning environments where all students can build on their strengths and fully engage in their learning; and get more students on track for graduation.

Coach Across America

More than just a Coach, AmeriCorps members serving with Coach Across America in New Orleans and Baton Rouge schools and sports-based organizations help open doors to mentorship, leadership, and to an opportunity for a new vision of what's possible for youth. Inside every young person in the program, there is greatness waiting to be seen.



Louisiana Vet Corps

AmeriCorps members serve as peer mentors to veterans and military-affiliated students at colleges and universities across Louisiana. Members connect veterans to the Louisiana Department of Veterans Affairs veterans' assistance programs, training faculty, LDVA staff and community members.



Feeding Louisiana

Feeding Louisiana's NourishCorps members strengthen the capacity of regional food banks to distribute food efficiently, support senior and child nutrition programs, and connect neighbors with essential food resources. Members participate in mobile food distributions, child nutrition programs, and program logistics while building relationships with neighbors and community partners.



Rebuilding Together New Orleans

AmeriCorps members engage in home repair projects in the New Orleans area. These projects improve the quality of life for area homeowners, including building projects to allow mobility and independence such as wheelchair ramps or exterior weatherization repairs to lower utility costs.

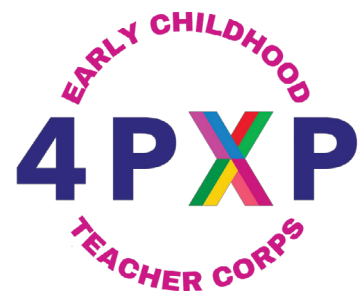
Food Bank of Central Louisiana

AmeriCorps members address food insecurity across nearly 30 communities in 11 parishes through the Food Bank's Mobile Pantry Program. The team assists with food distribution, Food Bank participant intake, relationship management, and other service referrals for Louisianans needing support.



SEE West Monroe

AmeriCorps members provide after-school homework assistance and enrichment activities to students in grades 1-3 during the school year. Members also implement a summer youth program and host financial literacy programs for adults at the West Monroe Community Center.



For Providers by Providers

AmeriCorps members serve in the Early Childhood Teacher Corps to enhance opportunities for youth from birth to 5 years of age. They implement activities to boost readiness, provide classroom support, and address the need for well-prepared early childhood teachers across New Orleans.



Serve Louisiana

AmeriCorps members provide capacity building services to increase the efficiency, effectiveness, and scope and reach of partner organizations that serve local children, families, and communities in the Baton Rouge and New Orleans areas.

ShreveCorps

AmeriCorps members improve area native biodiversity by cleaning and remediating unused lots in low-income ZIP codes of Caddo Parish. Members also assist with the Urban Farm Build a Farmer program, build pocket parks, create native habitat refuges, and improve public lands.



Teach For America

Teach for America – Louisiana

AmeriCorps members serve for two years as full-time teachers who promote academic growth for students, engage as volunteer leaders within their schools and communities, and engage parents and community members as volunteers in low-income and under-resourced schools.

Tulane University

Through the Tulane University Center for Public Service, Tulane University AmeriCorps members are students in the fields of public health, social work, or architecture and serve with New Orleans organizations to reduce homelessness. During the summer additional student teams support youth camps to reduce learning loss and promote healthy lifestyles.



University of Louisiana at Lafayette AmeriCorps

AmeriCorps members serve with several initiatives, including: building homes with Habitat for Humanity; providing academic support at two elementary schools in Lafayette; and engaging in community and university-based environmental stewardship projects to promote environmental sustainability.

SPOTLIGHT ON SERVICE



LATONYA TUCO

Latonya's high energy, genuine heart, and willingness to serve made her a "beacon of hope" and inspiration to her colleagues who looked up to her as a motivator and advocate. Latonya's supervisor stated, "she is the definition of what AmeriCorps stands for, fulfilling all of her assignments with passion and motivating others to do the same!"



HILARY NGUYEN

Hilary volunteered and interned for over 500 hours at Recirculating Farms, a New Orleans-based food justice nonprofit, before joining the team through the Serve Louisiana AmeriCorps program. She expanded outreach to veterans and a Vietnamese farmers' cooperative, promoted the Food Forward gleaning program, and led the second annual Community Health Day, broadening it to include mental health and housing resources.



MASHUNTI JONES

MaShunti was an outstanding AmeriCorps member who devoted herself to supporting her first grade afterschool classroom. She provided individualized support, led engaging literacy and enrichment activities, and consistently served as a positive role model. Her dedication, preparedness, and positive attitude had a meaningful impact on students' academic growth and social-emotional development.



JORDAN ASHMORE

Jordan made a significant impact as a coach at Samuel J. Green Charter School. He balanced a demanding academic schedule with consistent service to students, serving as a strong role model and example of college success. His dedication helped reignite interest in the Coach Across America program at other schools, and he further expanded his impact by mentoring the 13-17 NFL flag football team and the girls' basketball team.

AMERICORPS MILESTONES



Food Bank of Central Louisiana Mobile Pantry Program: 5 Years of Serving Rural, Central Louisiana Neighbors

Since 2020, the Mobile Pantry Program's AmeriCorps members have brought monthly food distributions to rural communities across central Louisiana, reducing barriers to access for low-income neighbors. AmeriCorps members distribute nutritious food, providing an average of 20 pounds per individual and 58 pounds per family. In 2024 alone, the program distributed more than 6.8 million pounds of food, serving 46,605 individuals from 19,572 households across 11 parishes.

University of Louisiana at Lafayette: 30 Years of a Collegiate-Based AmeriCorps Program

For 30 years, the University of Louisiana at Lafayette's collegiate-based AmeriCorps program has engaged more than 1,000 students, contributing over 16 million hours of service across Acadiana and Louisiana. Since 1995, members have supported student academic success, expanded access to safe housing and homeownership, responded to disasters, and advanced environmental sustainability on campus and in local communities.

City Year Baton Rouge: 20 Years of Service in the Capital City

In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, City Year Baton Rouge emerged to help thousands of students stay on track for graduation while cultivating leadership and service among young adults. Over the past 20 years, City Year Baton Rouge's AmeriCorps members have continued their service and commitment to the community so that all children and young adults have the skills and resources they need to thrive in Baton Rouge and beyond.

35 Years of Teach For America in Louisiana

Teach For America (TFA) began serving Louisiana schools in Baton Rouge and New Orleans in 1990 and joined the AmeriCorps State program in 1994. Since then, nearly 4,000 TFA AmeriCorps members – many of whom moved to Louisiana for this purpose – have served Louisiana students, with more than 1,300 alumni and current members continuing to live, lead, and serve across 34 parishes statewide.

Lisa Moore Marks 25 Years of Service with Serve Louisiana

Lisa Moore, executive director of Serve Louisiana, celebrated 25 years leading its AmeriCorps program. Lisa has led hundreds of AmeriCorps members across south Louisiana to serve local organizations that improve lives and build stronger communities. Volunteer Louisiana staff joined Serve Louisiana's AmeriCorps members, former Executive Director Betsy Irvine, and Program Director Maggie Conarro to honor Lisa with a Volunteer Service Award.

AmeriCorps Seniors Foster Grandparent Program: 60 Years of Intergenerational Service

In 2025, Volunteer Louisiana celebrated 60 years of the AmeriCorps Seniors Foster Grandparent Program, honoring volunteers whose intergenerational service transformed classrooms statewide, including more than 38,000 hours of support in DeSoto Parish benefiting 700 students and 37 teachers.



DISASTER SERVICES

Volunteer Louisiana is charged in the state's Emergency Operations Plan with the coordination of spontaneous volunteers. The commission is the recipient of a competitive Volunteer Generation Fund (VGF) grant from the AmeriCorps agency. This grant award is applied to increase volunteer capacity for Louisiana's disaster preparedness, response, and recovery efforts with an emphasis on Community Emergency Response (CERT) trainings.

BUILDING VOLUNTEER INFRASTRUCTURE

Building Volunteer Infrastructure for a Stronger Louisiana

In 2025, Volunteer Louisiana expanded its menu of public-facing disaster training options to better serve communities with varying capacities, priorities, and readiness levels across the state. Rather than offering a single training model, partners were able to choose from a range of options, including logistical support, targeted workshops built from select CERT modules or full eight-module CERT trainings, with or without the formation of a formal CERT team. This flexible, partnership-driven approach ensured that organizations in every region of Louisiana could access training that fit their mission, resources, and community needs, strengthening preparedness in practical and sustainable ways.

2025 TRAINING IMPACT



LT. GOVERNOR'S VOLUNTEER & DISASTER SERVICES SUMMIT

As part of Volunteer Louisiana's expanded, flexible approach to disaster preparedness, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor and Volunteer Louisiana convened the first annual Lieutenant Governor's Volunteer & Disaster Services Summit to strengthen coordination across Louisiana's disaster services ecosystem.

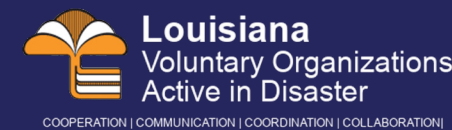
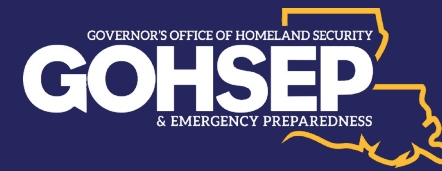
The summit brought together participants from 63 organizations including Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser; Major General Thomas C. Friloux, Adjutant General of Louisiana; and the Louisiana Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) Board of Directors. Discussions focused on aligning partners with varying capacities, readiness levels, and missions around shared goals for preparedness, response, and recovery.

By convening diverse partners and supporting multiple pathways for engagement, the summit reinforced Volunteer Louisiana's commitment to meeting communities where they are and building a coordinated, volunteer-driven system that strengthens disaster readiness statewide.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHTS

Strengthening VOAD Capacity Through State Agency Partnerships

Following back-to-back major hurricanes, Louisiana VOAD recognized the need for greater administrative stability and regional network support despite having no paid staff. In 2021, through a formal partnership between Volunteer Louisiana and the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, gubernatorially appointed leaders from both agencies were added as ex-officio members of the LAVOAD board. Since that time, this collaborative model has strengthened institutional knowledge, modernized core systems and improved alignment with emergency management resulting in a more resilient and effective statewide organization.



Partner Spotlight: Team Rubicon & Louisiana State Parks

In 2025, Volunteer Louisiana partnered with Louisiana State Parks and veteran-led Team Rubicon to enhance disaster readiness by combining volunteer service, chainsaw training, and our world-class park system. Looking ahead, Volunteer Louisiana and Team Rubicon are working to expand Louisiana's in-state volunteer capacity, reducing reliance on out-of-state resources and increasing the speed and effectiveness of post-disaster debris operations. This partnership exemplifies how state agencies and volunteer-driven organizations can align strengths to build skilled volunteer pipelines, support veterans' continued service, and strengthen community resilience statewide.





VOLUNTEERISM

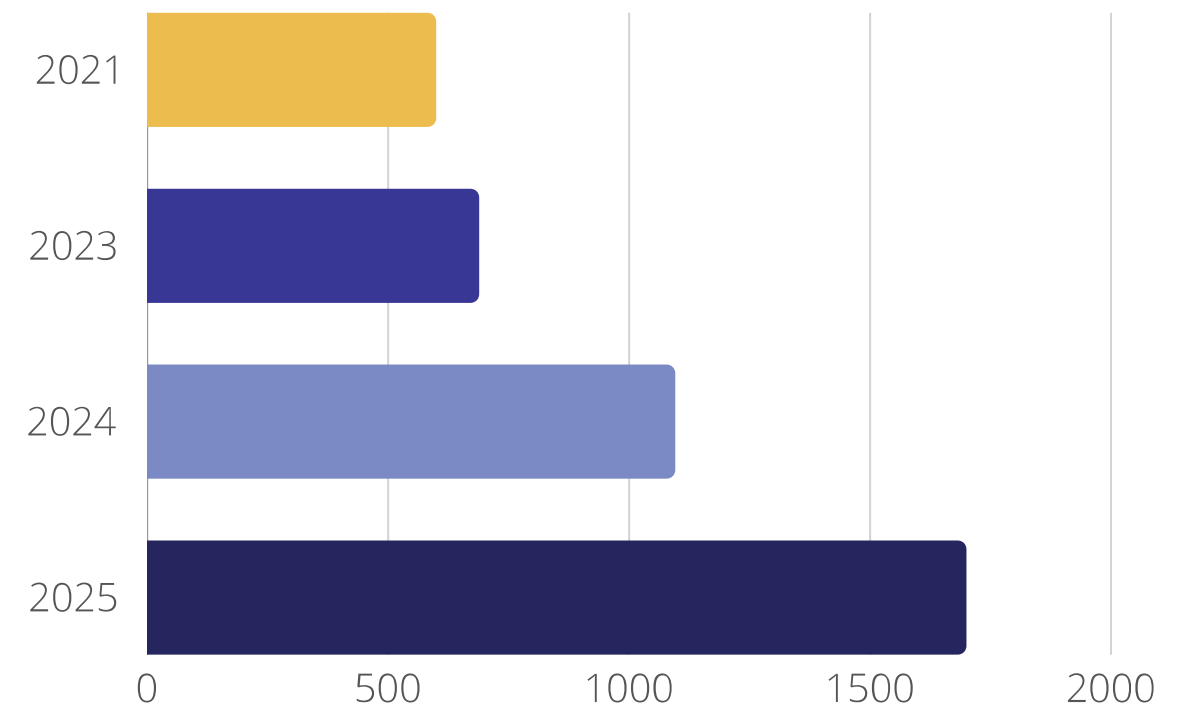
Volunteerism is essential to building strong, resilient communities across Louisiana. Volunteer Louisiana works to strengthen the state's culture of service by promoting volunteerism and connecting citizens of all skills, interests, and abilities with nonprofit and governmental organizations in need of support. Through these connections, we help address critical community needs while empowering individuals to make a meaningful difference. Our two signature award programs recognize outstanding volunteers whose dedication and impact exemplify the power of service and inspire others to give back.

VOLUNTEER SERVICE AWARDS

The Louisiana Volunteer Service Award is a free, statewide recognition tool that helps organizations celebrate volunteers and reinforce service as a shared Louisiana value. Available to anyone volunteering in the state, the award includes a certificate signed by Lt. Governor Billy Nungesser and is often paired with a lapel pin for community recognition events.

By making volunteer recognition accessible and meaningful, Volunteer Louisiana is strengthening volunteer retention, visibility, and engagement across all 64 parishes.

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT TRAINING

Volunteer Engagement Training: A New Statewide Service

In 2025, Volunteer Louisiana launched a new Volunteer Engagement Training curriculum to help organizations improve how they recruit, support, and retain volunteers. This free professional development service equips early-career professionals with the foundational skills needed to build effective and sustainable volunteer programs across Louisiana.

This training addresses a critical workforce gap in the nonprofit and public service sectors. In 2026, Volunteer Louisiana will expand the program through regional in-person trainings and online sessions, increasing access statewide.

What the Training Covers

The Volunteer Engagement Training curriculum includes modular sessions focused on core volunteer management practices:

- › Strategic Volunteer Roles
- › Volunteer Recruitment & Retention
- › Volunteer Screening & Placement
- › Volunteer Recognition

- › Building organizational capacity statewide

Roy Griggs

Northwest Region Champion

Shreveport, LA | Ronald McDonald House Charities of Northwest Louisiana

A philanthropic leader, Roy spearheaded fundraising efforts to bring northwest Louisiana's first Ronald McDonald House to life, securing more than \$9.2 million in just over two years. This initiative provided critical support and comfort to families with children receiving medical care in Shreveport hospitals.



Ado Soul

Southwest Region Champion

Jeanerette, LA | ASM Cares

Through his nonprofit ASM Cares, Ado Soul provided meals, groceries, and youth mentorship to families across southwest Louisiana. He also connected young people to career pathways and taught African American history through music, blending service, education, and creativity.



Danny Acree

Northeast Region Champion

West Monroe, LA | Two Penny Missions

Danny co-founded Two Penny Missions alongside his son to provide safe, short-term housing, food, and employment support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The organization offers compassion, dignity, and stability to women, children, and families in crisis across Ouachita Parish.



Ayushi Purohit

Southeast / Northshore Region Champion

Covington, LA | Sewn With Love

Ayushi combined creativity and compassion through Sewn With Love, raising funds for children impacted by abuse by selling handmade items. Her volunteer service supported healthcare access, children's advocacy, and families in need across the Northshore.



Challie Mercer

Central Region Champion

Ball, LA | The Broom Tree

Challie founded The Broom Tree to support children with special needs and their families through grants, camps, and resources. Her newest initiative, Jake's Place, is the first all-inclusive indoor play facility in Central Louisiana, creating access, inclusion, and opportunity for families and individuals with disabilities.



Breea Carter

Statewide AmeriCorps Champion

Baton Rouge, LA | Mary's Hands Network / Serve Louisiana

As an AmeriCorps member, Breea provided volunteer doula services and advocated for equitable maternal healthcare across Louisiana. Her service focused on education, outreach, and support for women in communities facing higher risks during pregnancy and childbirth.

Baton Rouge, LA | Keep Tiger Town Beautiful

Jennifer led Keep Tiger Town Beautiful, a volunteer-driven movement that removes tens of thousands of bags of litter from Baton Rouge each year. Through cleanups, advocacy, and community empowerment, she helped to build cleaner, safer, and more connected neighborhoods.

Arita led the creation of Anthony's Missing Pieces Playground, an inclusive play space designed for children of all abilities. Through determination and community fundraising, she created a welcoming environment where children with disabilities can play, connect, and belong.

Denham Springs, LA | Mighty Moms
